ATTACHMENT TO NOTICE OF EXEMPTION

132.2, 132.7 and 705, Title 14, CCR, Re: Adoption of a Lost or Abandoned Dungeness Crab Trap Gear Retrieval Program

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (Department) has taken final action under the Fish and Game Code and the Administrative Procedure Act with respect to the above-referenced project. On July 17, 2019, the Department filed a final statement of reasons with the Office of Administrative Law to add Section 132.7 to Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations (CCR), as well as amend Sections 132.2 and 705 of Title 14, CCR. The project was discussed at a public hearing held in Santa Rosa, CA, on April 2, 2019 and a second public hearing held in Monterey, CA on June 25, 2019.

For the purposes of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA, Pub. Resources Code, Section 21000 et seq.), the Department adopted the regulations relying on the Class 7 categorical exemption for "Actions by Regulatory Agencies for Protection of Natural Resources" and the Class 8 categorical exemption for "Actions by Regulatory Agencies for Protection of the Environment" contained in CEQA Guideline Sections 15307 and 15308, Title 14, CCR, respectively.

Categorical Exemptions to Protect Natural Resources and the Environment

In compliance with CEQA, the Department adopted the regulation relying on the categorical exemptions contained in CEQA Guidelines of Title 14, CCR: Section 15307 (Action by Regulatory Agencies for Protection of Natural Resources) and Section 15308 (Action by Regulatory Agencies for Protection of the Environment). The exemptions apply to agency actions to protect natural resources and the environment, respectively.

The proposed project will incentivize the removal of lost or abandoned commercial Dungeness crab traps that are no longer being actively fished after the end of the commercial fishing season, and that otherwise could remain in ocean waters on the seafloor. The associated lines and buoys of the trap also pose a marine life entanglement risk. This activity has the overall effect of reducing this entanglement risk and removing traps from the marine environment, and thereby is the proper subject of CEQA's Class 7 and 8 categorical exemptions.
