Riverside County has discussed the Project with California Department of Fish and Wildlife, United States Fish and Wildlife Service, as well as the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) and Native American tribes under Assembly Bill 52 tribal consultation. Based on input received during the public scoping period and at the scoping meeting, concerns expressed by the public and agencies addressed potential impacts of the project on: aesthetics, agricultural resources, air quality, biological resources, cultural resources, hazards and hazardous materials, hydrology and water quality, land use, noise, property access, public services, and traffic and circulation. A scoping report was prepared for the Project in June 2018. A full copy of the report is provided in EIR Appendix A. Public scoping comments are also summarized in EIR Section 1.5 (Scoping Comments Summary).
